BIOGRAPHY

Sarah Hankins is a director, actor, teacher, and arts leader with a strong focus in collaboration, physical theatre and heightened language. Hankins is a proud Appalachian hailing from the coal-fields of Virginia and is determined to keep alive the storytelling tradition of her ancestors. Currently, she is the interim artistic director and learning director at Triad Stage, where she has directed "White Lightning," "Pride and Prejudice," and four seasons of "A Christmas Carol," as well as appearing in "The Passion of Teresa Rae King."

Hankins worked in NYC for eight years as a freelance actor, director and teaching artist with a thriving downtown career. Hankins is the former artistic director of the NYC eco-theatre Green Theatre Collective and was an associate artist at Orlando Shakespeare Theatre, where she performed, directed and taught for six years.

Regional credits include: Virginia Shakespeare, Georgia Shakespeare, Shakespeare & Company, Bristol Riverside, Virginia Shakespeare, Depot Theatre and Burning Coal. Hankins has been fortunate to perform over 25 Shakespearean roles and direct over 15 productions of Shakespeare's works. Hankins has taught at The College of St. Elizabeth in NJ, Greensboro College, Greensboro Technical Community College, University of North Carolina at Greensboro, and Guilford College. As always, thanks to mom and SGH.

Sarah DeLappe's (playwright) acclaimed play "The Wolves" premiered Off-Broadway at The Playwrights Realm, following an engagement at New York Stage and Film and development at Clubbed Thumb and Great Plains Theatre Conference. The play was subsequently remounted at Lincoln Center.

"The Wolves," which was a Pulitzer Prize finalist, has also received the Lucille Lortel Award, the American Playwriting Foundation's inaugural Relentless Award, Outer Critics Circle nominations for Best Play/Emerging Playwright, the Relentless Award, Sky Cooper New American Play Prize and was a finalist for the Susan Smith Blackburn Prize and the Yale Drama Series prize.

DeLappe's fellowships and developmental support include The MacDowell Colony, The Ground Floor, LCT3 Playwright in Residence, Ars Nova Play Group, Page One Fellowship at The Playwrights Realm, SPACE on Ryder Farm and Sitka Fellows Program. Past affiliation include Clubbed Thumb's Early Career Writers' Group and New Georges Audrey Residency. DeLappe earned her MFA in process at Brooklyn College.
